CHILD-CENTRED DISASTER RISK REDUCTION (CC-DRR)

...a primary objective of CC-DRR is to strengthen children's skills so that they understand the disaster risk in their communities and are able to take a lead role in reducing that risk...

Can a CC-DRR approach translate to more effective Response and Recovery for children, families, communities?
