



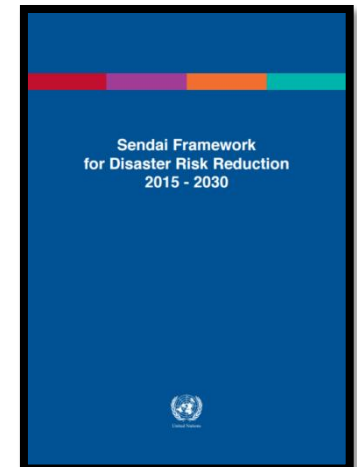

Australia's approach



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Shift from Hyogo to Sendai

- Adopted at the Third UN World Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction in Sendai, Japan on 18 March 2015
- Succeeds the *Hyogo Framework for Action 2005-2015*
- Shifts focus from disaster management to cross-sectoral disaster risk management

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1 OUTCOME

The substantial reduction of disaster risk and losses in lives, livelihoods and health and in the economic, physical, social, cultural and environmental assets of persons, businesses, communities and countries

1 GOAL

Prevent new and reduce existing disaster risk through the implementation of integrated and inclusive economic, structural, legal, social, health, cultural, educational, environmental, technological, political and institutional measures that prevent and reduce hazard exposure and vulnerability to disaster, increase preparedness for response and recovery, and thus strengthen resilience

Understanding disaster risk

Strengthening disaster risk governance to manage disaster risk

Investing in disaster risk reduction for resilience

Enhancing disaster preparedness for effective response, and to "Build Back Better" in recovery, rehabilitation and reconstruction
